### SOUTH SUNDARBAN JANAKALYAN SANGHA

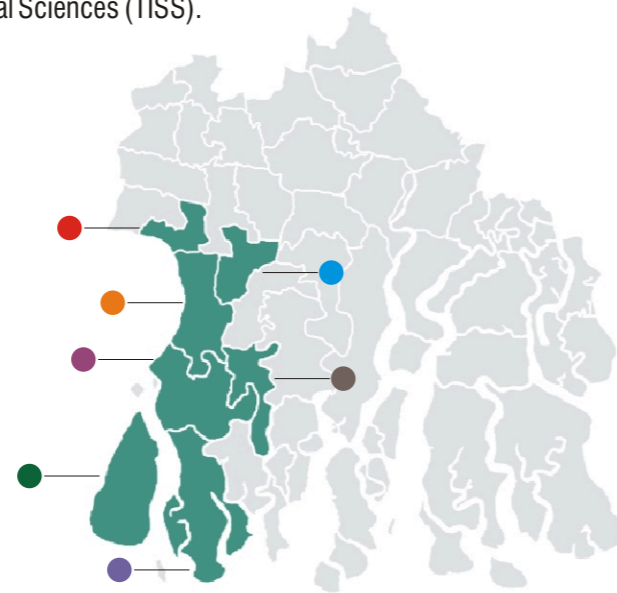
Founded in 1990 by a group of energetic and philanthropic enthusiasts, South Sundarban Janakalyan Sangha or SSJS is a non profit civil society organisation. Based in Raghunathpur village under Srinagar Panchayat of Kakdwip block , the organisation works for the upliftment of rural people irrespective of caste, creed and race. SSJS also has two project offices; one at Rajnagar, Birbhum and the other at Maithon, Jharkhand.

The organisation is registered under West Bengal Societies Act 1961. Registration No. S/67639 of 1991-92 dated 26 April 1991 including Foreign Contribution Regulation Act (FCRA) 1976, Ministry of Home Affairs, GoI vide renewal registration No. 147110370 dated 6 May 2017. Also registered for the exemption of u/s 80G, 12A, PAN, TAN of IT Act, 1961 and Professional Tax under IT Act. SSJS is affiliated to Credibility Alliance, Guidestar India and Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS).

## EDUCATION

### Sundarban B.ED College

Recognised by National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) and affiliated to The West Bengal University of Teachers' Training, Education, Planning and Administration (WBUTTEPA), Sundarban B. Ed College offers professional degree course for aspiring teachers. This two-year course accommodates 200 students in each academic year.



### IMPACT

Housed in a rural setup, Sundarban B. Ed College helps to meet the needs of students who come from humble and poor background. The college offers a subsidised course fee for poor and deserving students particularly those coming from SC, ST, OBC and other minority communities. Students avail study materials and books from the college library, free of cost.

Moreover students belonging to SC, ST, OBC and other minority communities also receive scholarships from Govt. of West Bengal.

This college offers a great opportunity for the students of rural areas to not only earn a degree to be eligible for teaching profession, but they also become confident to appear and apply for government jobs for teaching in schools and colleges.

The students are also given all-round exposure to develop their personality and communication skills in order to be prepared for job-readiness.

### Sundarban Primary Teachers' Training Institute (D.El. Ed)

Diploma in Elementary Education or D. El. Ed is a two year teachers' training programme for students who have passed Class XII. The course is recognised by National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) and affiliated to West Bengal Board of Primary Education (WBBPE). The course accommodates 100 regular students each year.

### IMPACT

This course helps all those students who aspire to be primary school teachers. Sundarban Primary Teachers' Training Institute (S.P.T.T.I) offers concession in admission fee for poor student belonging to SC, ST, OBC and other minority communities. They also receive scholarships from Govt. of West Bengal.

These students who otherwise cannot afford to get admission in urban elite colleges, prepare themselves for appearing in admission exams for government as well as private jobs.





### **NIOS Study Centre for D. El. Ed (for in-service teachers)**

National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) study centre is run at the campus of Sundarban B. Ed College. Sanctioned by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) Gol, the centre provide the facility to secure Diploma in Teaching and Education to in-service teachers who are already in the job. The institute has provided quality training to untrained teachers who are teaching in primary or secondary classes. This has not only helped secure their jobs but has also infused in them the confidence to continue to impart quality education. At present 100 in-service-para teachers are enrolled at the centre.

### **WBBPE Study Centre (ODL mode-D. EL. ED course)**

Sundarban B. Ed College also serves as a West Bengal Board for Primary Education study centre for Open and Distance Learning (ODL) course. This course is particularly meant for those in-service teachers who are unable to attend regular classes due to their current jobs. Currently there are 100 such teachers availing the service.

### **Sundarban Rural Library**

Sundarban Rural Library is a noble initiative of SSJS with the aim to promote reading habits among young learners and enhance their knowledge. The library, establish around 3 years back is housed in the office campus of SSJS. This initiative is taken with the support of District Library, South 24 Parganas and SSJS' own fund.

The library has created a positive impact among the young minds of the area. The

library has reference books related to school curriculum as well has books of other interests. The young students avail the service free of cost and benefit from the vast resources available in the library. At present the library has 227 members. Besides students, this library also caters to people of the community, both young and old. who borrow books and read them for leisure.



### **CRECHE CENTRES**

#### **National Creche Centres & Balwadi Centres**

SSJS has been running the Creche Centres with the purpose of providing care and support to the children of poor families, where both the parents leave home for labour work during the day. This has been particularly beneficial to families where parents go for work under MGNREGS.

The children at the creche centres are given different kinds of facilities and support including dress, books and study materials, games equipments, school bags, medicines and food.

## SAFE DRINKING WATER

SSJS has been working to provide safe drinking water to the rural population over the years. In the last financial year, with the support of **Coal India Limited and WBSEDCL** it has installed 13 tube wells for drinking water in Kakdwip, Diamond Harbour and Kulpi.

### কাকদ্বীপে পানীয় জলের সংকট মোচাচ্ছে স্বেচ্ছাসেবী সংগঠন

নিজস্ব সংবাদদাতা, চোলাহাট : পরম পড়তে না পড়তেই জলের তর নেমে যাওয়ায় পানীয় জলের সংকট দেখা দিয়েছে। এই সংকট মোকাবিলায় কাকদ্বীপের সাউথ সুন্দরবনের একটি স্বেচ্ছাসেবী সংগঠন এগিয়ে এসেছে। সংস্থার কর্ণধার রফিকউদ্দিন মোহা বসেন, 'আমরা কাকদ্বীপ ব্লকের শ্রীনগর, সুব্দগর, মনুসুন্দপুর গ্রামপঞ্চায়েতে ও পাথরপ্রতিমা ব্লকের দুবাচাটি, গোপালনগর, বনশ্যাম নগরগ্রাম পঞ্চায়েতে এবং ডায়মন্ড হারবার ১ নং ব্লকের বাসুলজাঙ্গ গ্রামপঞ্চায়েতে শতাধিক পরিষ্কৃত পানীয় জলের

টিউবওয়েল বসিয়েছি। বিভিন্ন ব্লকে কয়েক হাজার সুলভ শৌচাগার করে দিয়েছি। কুলপি ব্লকের কামারচক গ্রামপঞ্চায়েতেও ৫টি পরিষ্কৃত পানীয় জলের টিউবওয়েল বসিয়েছি। সরা চণ্ডীপুর গ্রামপঞ্চায়েতের জগদীশপুর, হাচকি ও উলুপাড় গ্রামে পশ্চিমবঙ্গ রাজ্য বিদ্যুৎ বন্টন সংস্থা লিমিটেডের আর্থিক সাহায্যে সেক্স ড্রিঙ্কিং ওয়াটার প্রজেক্টের মাধ্যমে ৩টি পরিষ্কৃত পানীয় জলের টিউবওয়েল বসিয়েছি।' কুলপির বিভিন্ন সঞ্জীব সেন বলেন, 'এ ধরনের কাজকে আমরা স্বাগত জানাই।'



### ACHIEVEMENTS

These tubewells provided safe drinking water for the people of these villages. This led to decrease in common ailments particularly water borne diseases. This also triggered a change in behaviour of health and hygiene.



## INDIVIDUAL HOUSEHOLD LATRINE

With the financial support of **Coal India Limited and ONGC**, SSJS has constructed a total of 162 latrines in Kakdwip and Diamond Harbour block.

### ACHIEVEMENTS

Around 1,000 people in two Panchayats of Kakdwip and Diamond Harbour block have reaped benefits of these individual latrines.

This has not only helped making these villages cleaner and hygienic but have also immensely contributed to reduction of diseases, particularly water borne diseases and improved the health conditions of the beneficiaries.

Moreover the villagers have developed a healthy habit of not using the open space for defecation and use the latrines.

Privacy and safety of women has increased and they are happy to have this asset in their homes.



## LIVELIHOOD

SSJS has been working to improve the livelihood conditions of the poor people of the area through the SHGs. It has taken up several income generation initiatives to ensure that the members of the SHGs become self reliant and earn additional income to support their families. SSJS has primarily channelised the fund from its own coffers and with contribution from beneficiaries. Some of these initiative are:

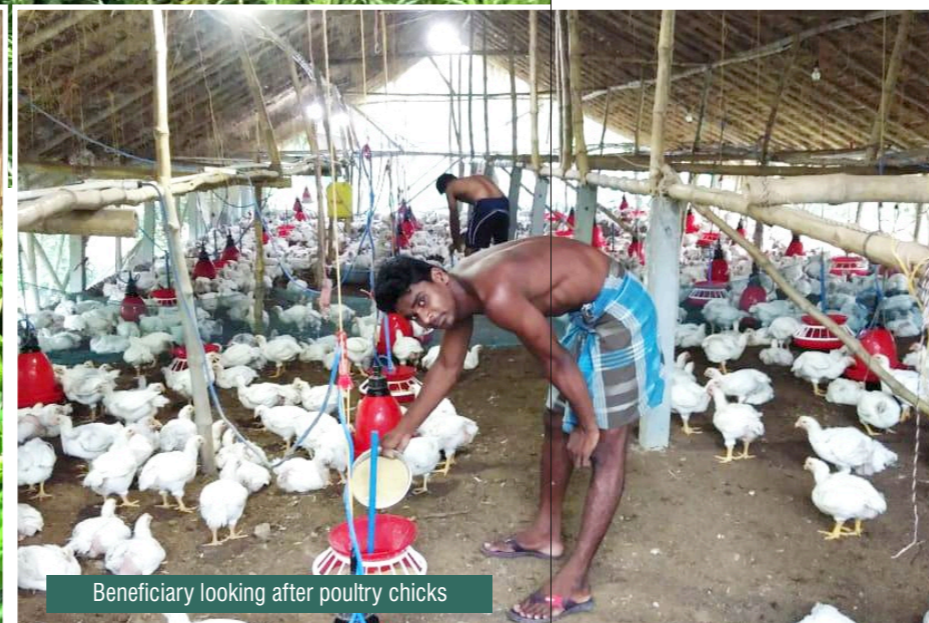

| Chicken poultry farm     | 25 chicks were given to the SHG members. These when grown up, were sold and the profit was revolved to further buy more chicks to continue the process.  | 5                         |
| Beetle vine cultivation  | Beetle leaf (commonly known as Pan) is of good demand in market around Bengal. The leaf is eaten by many people in Bengal and sold extensively in shops around. SSJS excavated ponds and did land shaping. It provided support to raise the land and make it suitable for beetle vine cultivation. It also provided beetle saplings to members. A regular income is assured from these beetle vine. Many members also took saplings from these vines and started new beetle vine cultivation. This has been a regular income earner as a part of sustainable agriculture initiative. | 5                         |
| Vegetable cultivation    | SSJS provided knowlege and seed support to members of SHGs to cultivate through kitchen gardens. Chillie, ladies' finger, spinach, brinjal, gourd etc. were cultivated by the women to provide family nutrition. Surplus was often sold for income.  | 15                        |

### ACHIEVEMENTS

These income generation initiatives to develop livelihood options for SHG women have gone a long way not only to generate income but also plan and organise resources so that these can give sustained benefits. The members of the SHGs taking up these activities have also increased their confidence in their efforts and turned self dependent in many aspects of their family lives. Their efforts have involved other members of their family in their pursuit to be economically self reliant.

The increased income for the family was and is being used to meet different needs like education, health and even family celebrations like marriages.

Most of the livelihood activities were done in Kakdwip block area. Vegetable cultivation activities were done in Diamond Harbour block.



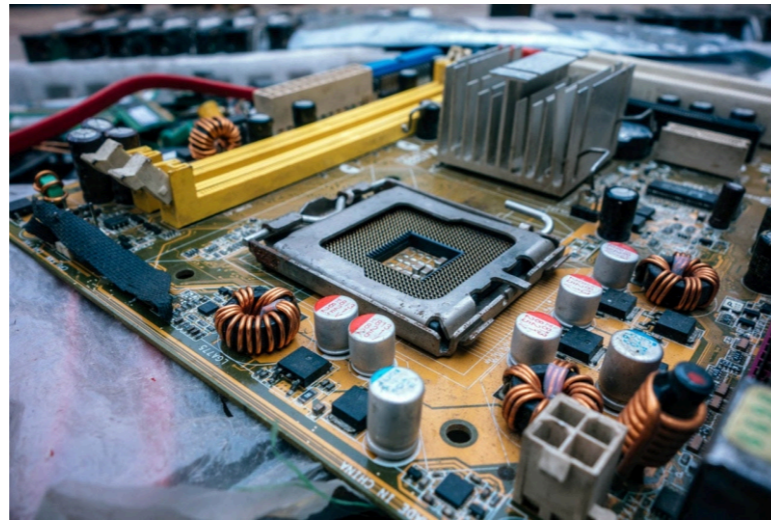
## SKILL TRAINING

Keeping in mind the unemployed youth looking for skilled jobs, SSJS conducted several skill enhancement training for young boys and girls. Utilising its own fund and with a small contribution from the learners, SSJS conducted nine different types of skill trainings in separate batches over the past year.

### ACHIEVEMENTS

These skill trainings have increased the employability of these youth, most of whom had poor educational background. As a result of the training many of them are now working in different work sectors. Some of them have taken to self employment by starting their own small business in carpentry, tailoring and electronic repair shops.



## COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAMME

SSJS has organised a 40 Health Awareness Programmes in Kakdwip, Diamond Harbour, Kulpi and Patharpratima block of West Bengal, Rajnagar block of Birbhum and Egarkund block of Dhanbad, Jharkhand. It has also organised a Clinic Programme on Homeopathy in SSJS campus. Different health related issues were discussed in these programmes including immunisation, institutional delivery, social security schemes offered by the government.

SSJS also organised free health checkup camps for students, creche and Balwadis and villagers, where these centres are located. A total of five such centres and five villages were covered through these camps, in Kakdwip block.

### ACHIEVEMENTS

The area of operation where SSJS works is remote. Access to health institutions and availability of qualified doctors are difficult.

These programmes organised by SSJS sensitised the community members on different aspects of health, preventions of diseases and what should be done to remain healthy and fit.

These programmes also offered free health checkup for students and their families and provided basic medicines. The purpose was to keep these children healthy and happy so that they may be able to play and study well.

## SEMINARS

Apart from these Independence Day, Republic Day and SSJS Foundation Day was also celebrated. More than 1,300 people participated in these programmes. The programme stressed on issues like women's rights, inspirational teachings by great personalities and issues that affect our lives.





## SPORTS

SSJS believes that simply serious work is not enough for an all round development of human being. Sports and games are an essential part of development. During the last year SSJS organised several sporting events in the college and also among the creche center children and village youth. The sporting events included, football, volleyball and cricket tournaments and sports for children. These events were organised primarily with SSJS funds in Diamond Harbour and Kakdwip blocks. More than 470 children and youth participated in these games.

## CULTURAL PROGRAMMES

SSJS also conducted different competition for students and villagers to spread the message of cultural heritage and national integration among the people. Debate on Dr. Rajendra Prasad, competitions on Rabindra and Nazrul songs, recitation and dance were organised for college students. Cultural drama programmes were also performed in Kakdwip at the village level.

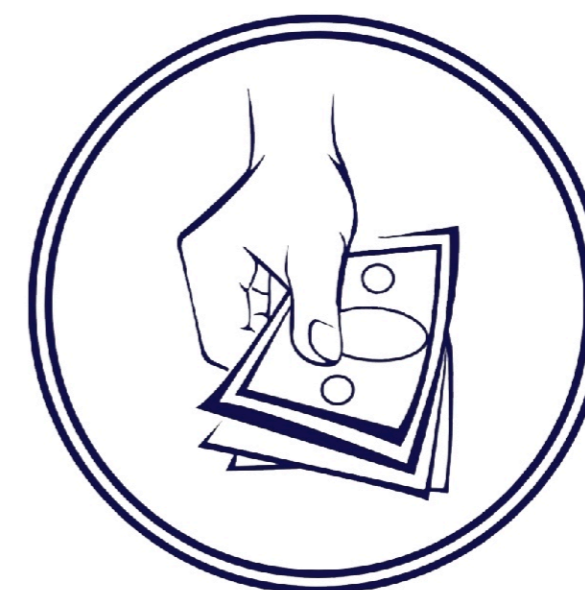
